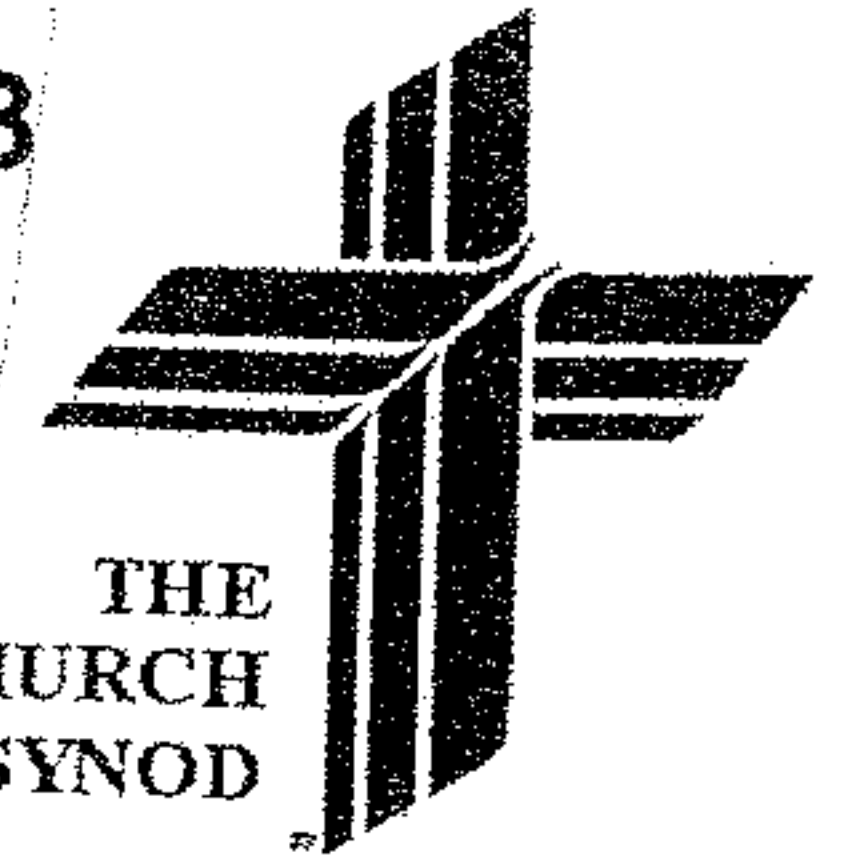

Thoughts From The Pastor

My eyes saw it way before Halloween - "Christmas" displays and merchandise. But now in mid-November my ears are hearing it - "Christmas" music in stores as background noise.

I put "Christmas" in quotations because most of the stuff we see and most of the music we are hearing now really has nothing to do with the birth of Jesus the Savior, Christ the Lord. I think most of us have gotten used to that, even if we don't like it or think that it's not right. But that's just the way it is in our free society.

Music, though, has always been an important part of the worship of the Lord God's people. For instance, after the Lord God defeated of the Egyptian army in the Red Sea and as their bodies washed up on the shore, Exodus 15 records a song of thanksgiving to the Lord by Moses and the people of Israel for His deliverance.

Music and singing can be used in conveying information, history, an idea, a cause, a mood, even silliness. God's people use the Lord's gift of music and singing in many different ways - from prayer to telling a story; from praising to sharing of the faith; from the depths of despair to proclaiming forgiveness. We take to heart the Word of God, and we make it our own, which says: "I will sing and make melody to the Lord" [Psalm 27:6] and "I will sing of the steadfast love of the Lord forever" [Psalm 89:1]

Our theme verse for Advent is: "Great indeed, we confess, is the mystery of godliness: [Christ] was manifested in the flesh, vindicated by the Spirit, seen by angels, proclaimed among the nations, believed on in the world, taken up in glory" [1 Timothy 3:16]. We will be using the following Advent and Christmas songs from our hymnal to help us reflect upon this verse on the first 3 Wednesdays in December [1st, 8th, and 15th] and on Sunday December 19th.

"A Great And Mighty Wonder"

"Of The Father's Love Begotten"

"Oh, Come All Ye Faithful"

"It Came Upon The Midnight Clear"

We will take time at the beginning of each Wednesday service [both at 12 noon and 7 p.m.] to sing hymns which the worshippers request from our hymnal.

This year let us approach the celebration of the birth of the world's Savior with songs on our lips, melodies in our hearts, and thanksgiving in our lives because the Christ Child is our Savior!

"Glory to God in the highest!"

May the love of the Lord Jesus always be in your hearts!

Preschool Happenings

December 2010

As we come to the end of November we are thankful for families who have put their children in our care, and for the St. Timothy family who has supported the ministry of this preschool and the staff's efforts to include the preschool families in our church home.

Each week there is a new Bible lesson that we teach the children. Our year began with lessons of God's Promises to Adam, Noah, Abraham, and Jacob. The promise focus continued in November with lessons about Moses as God's servant from his birth to receiving the Ten Commandments.

These promises are the focus of our Christmas celebration. "God's promises are true, for me, and YOU!" is the chant you will hear from the children on December 5th during our Christmas Program. This day will be a time for our preschool families to interact with the family of St. Timothy before, during, and after our service.

The month of December we will focus our teaching efforts on the celebration of Christ's birth with projects and a field trip to Fairwinds ~ Brighten Court for some caroling and hot chocolate with the residents. Our last day of classes for 2010 is on December 17th. We will return to school on January 3rd.

Enrollment continues to remain at 17 children, with 9 in the Prekindergarten class and 8 in the Preschool class. We have the ability to double enrollment should the Lord provide us with more families. Please share our Preschool ministry with folks you know or meet who might have children or grandchildren. You never know where that family is until you ASK and TELL.

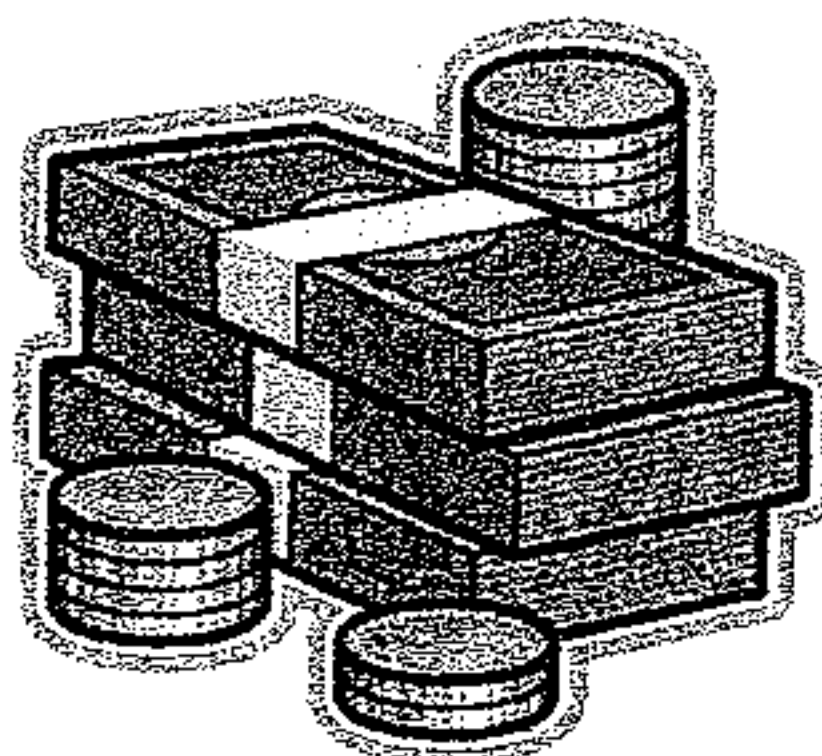
Messages from Your Council — Mel Suelzle



Our November council meeting was attended by council members Tom Smithson, Gary Eneberg, Janet Anderberg, Patsy Simon, Kim Reinig, Mel Suelzle and Pastor Flath. Also attending was Fred Starck and Cindy McEntire. The meeting was opened with a prayer followed by an agenda. Key agenda items are summarized below.

Financial System Review - Kathy Lassman attended our meeting and reviewed her findings and presented a summary report to the Council. In summary her report was very thorough and covered the important areas of our financial system. She made several suggestions for areas we should review but in general found that our procedures and accounts were much improved when compared with her review in 2005. Some of the more significant issues have been addressed. The Financial Committee will be reviewing her full report and make appropriate changes to our procedures. A complete copy of her report is available on the website, anyone that would like a hard copy of the report should contact Brenda Gonzalez. Kathy Lassman waived her normal fee for this review. In appreciation for her assistance, she was presented with a gift certificate for The Olive Garden.

Treasurer Report Tom Smithson distributed financial reports and reviewed the summary of our income/expense performance for October. Income for the month was \$17,333 which was almost 5% above our plan for the month of October and 2.49% of our year-to-date plan. Monthly expenses were 94% of our plan so our month net income was about \$1753 more than budgeted. Year-to-date our cash position improved by \$12,472. More information on our financial performance for October is reported separately in this newsletter.



Elders - Gary Eneberg and Fred Starck updated the council on Elder activities. Gary requested approval to purchase additional "Other Song Books" for use in Sunday services. Karl Simon has accepted a nomination for an Elder position and will be confirmed during the next Voter's meeting.

Preschool - Janet Anderberg and Cindy McEntire reported that we have 16 preschool students registered and classes continue to go well. A fire drill is planned for November 15th and a visit by the local fire department personnel is arranged to present information to the students and to review our procedures. The Lunch Bunch program has started with 2 students.

Social Ministry - Pat Jones filed a report that she plans to promote the "meals in a bag" donation program in November. The sock donation program is also planned for December. Members are encouraged to bring their stockings that have the monthly cash contributions to Services on December 5th. Council will determine the use of these contributions during the meeting on December 14th. Members are reminded that food donations are always needed, especially during the holiday season.

Pastor Report - Pastor Flath reported on his recent activities. He plans to attend the circuit meeting in November and is planning for our Advent activities.

Elections - The nominations process continues to be a problem. Those willing to serve are already overloaded and are unable to take on more. Those presently not serving are not inclined to do so. We are rapidly approaching a critical decision point in order to maintain functionality at St Timothy. Our next Voter's meeting will be the deadline to determine how we continue critical leadership positions.

Pastor Flath

St. Timothy welcomed **Pastor Richard Flath** as our new vacancy pastor on the first of October 2010. Pastor Flath is not a stranger to our church as he was one of our supply pastors from the end of Pastor Schuessler's time in January 2008 until Pastor Patterson assumed the position of Intentional Interim Pastor in June of 2009 for one year.

Pastor Flath grew up in Portland, Oregon. He graduated from Concordia College in Seward, Nebraska where he met Sandy. After college he was drafted into the US Army in 1970. Pastor and Sandy were married in Sandy's hometown of Boise, Idaho on December 30, 1970. After completing his two year obligation with the military, he entered Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri, graduating in 1976. In his first parish he became an Army Reserve Chaplain. He has served in the Army Reserve and National Guard as a chaplain for over 30 years, 20 years with the Washington Army National Guard. His longest pastorate was at Zion Lutheran Church in Snohomish where he served from May 1986 through December 2007.

Sandy Flath has been a school teacher for many years. She teaches all day kindergarten in a public school. She enjoys the little ones. She also has a strong interest in vocal music.

Pastor and Sandy have **four adult children**. Oldest daughter Kimberly is married to John. They have two daughters: 9 year old Emily and Katy just born October 10. Next is Christopher who is a pilot and is married to Jennifer. They have a son Andrew Prescott who was born in July. They live in Vancouver, Washington. Their third child is Nathan, who is engaged to Elizabeth- they are planning an April wedding. Nathan is a fire fighter, working for the National Forest Service in the summer and with Snohomish the rest of the year. Sarah is their youngest child. She is a preschool teacher with Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Everett.

When Pastor Flath was asked what has been his guiding call in serving the Lord, he said that he did not have a Martin Luther experience. [Luther was caught in a terrible storm and promised God that he would become a priest if God saved him.] Rather, he said that he felt the Lord's guiding to serve Him as a pastor. He also said that the Lord's faithfulness and goodness has been with him all his life. We are thankful for his faithful service to us here at St. Timothy.

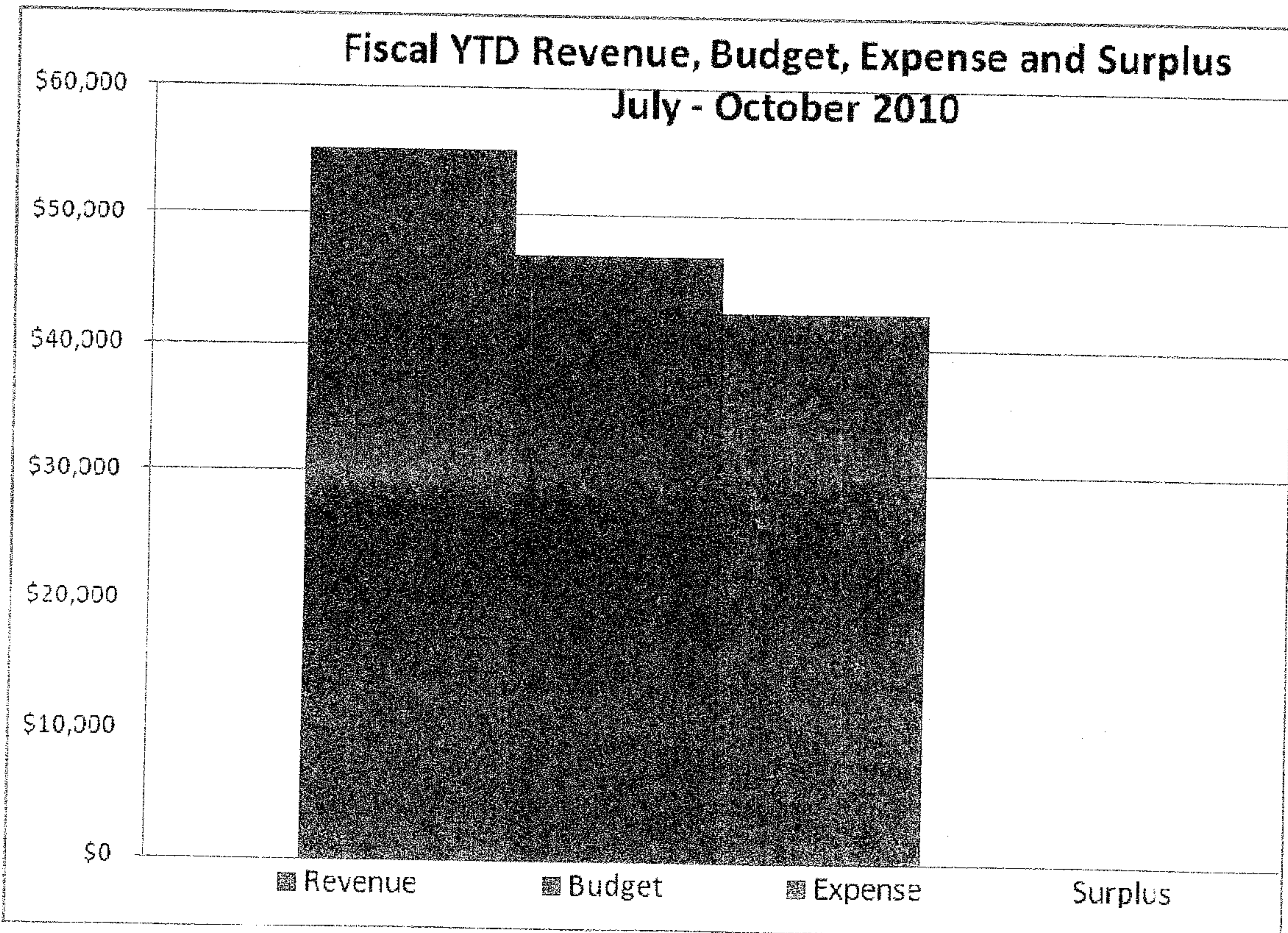
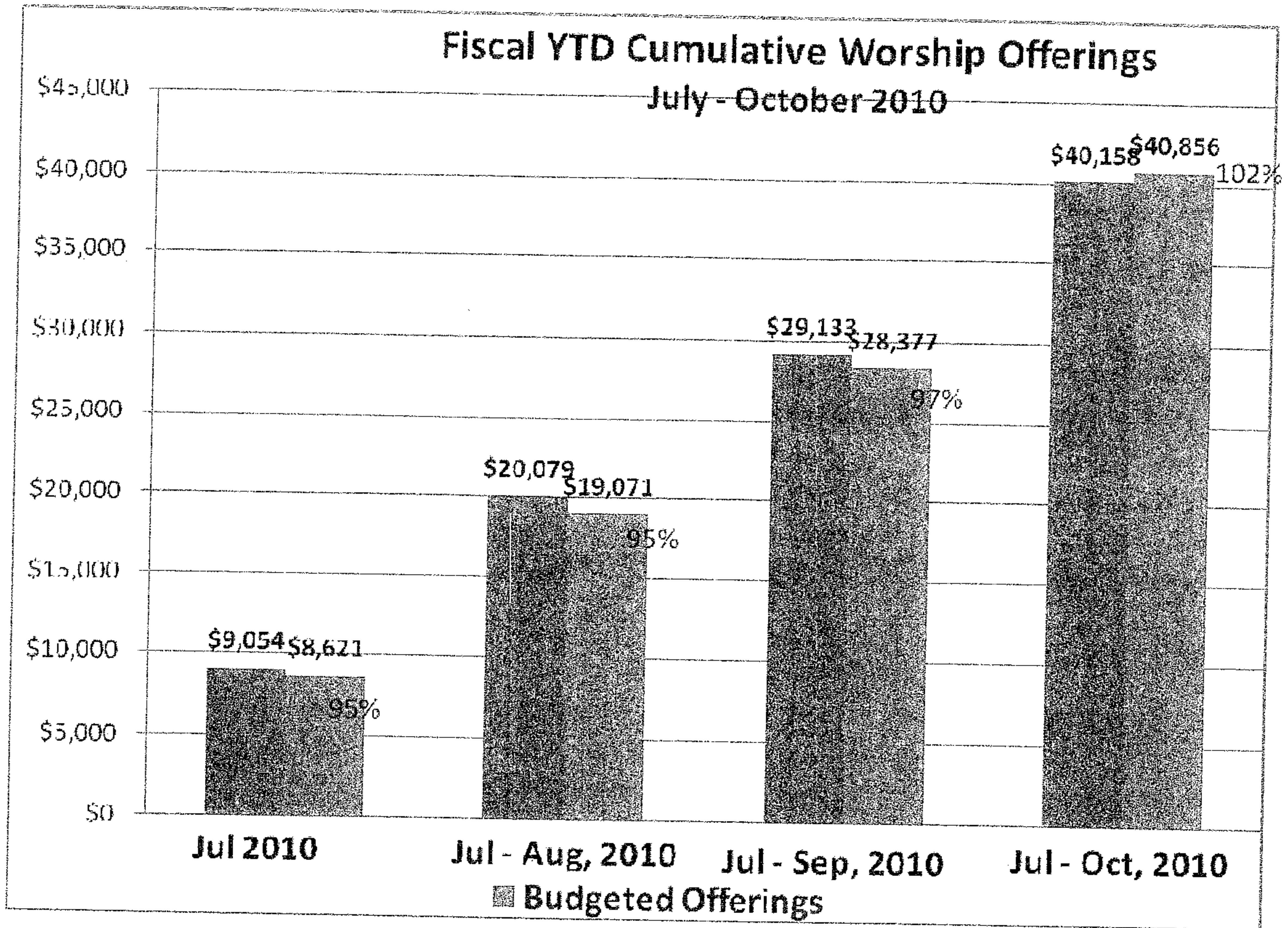
